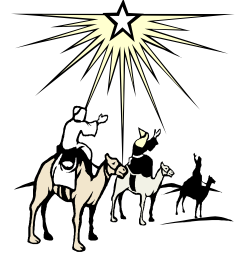

Social Ministry's **2015 May Project** will be collecting money for Malaria Nets.



A child dies from malaria every 60 seconds. Malaria is a disease caused by a parasite and transmitted by the bite of an infected mosquito. Since the start of the ELCA Malaria Campaign, we have already seen a reduction in the number of deaths from this preventable, treatable disease. By joining hands with Lutheran partners in 13 African countries, (Angola, Burundi, Central African Republic, Liberia, Malawi, Mozambique, Namibia, Nigeria, South Sudan, Tanzania, Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe), we are becoming part of the global movement to make malaria history — for good. Working through Lutheran partners in Africa, the ELCA Malaria Campaign helps provide mosquito nets, education, testing, medication, and more to help eliminate deaths from this disease.

## EPIPHANY MAY JUNIOR WARDEN- PROPERTY REPORT



I am pleased to report that we have survived a long winter with no major property damage from frozen, burst pipes; downed trees or limbs from snow, ice, and wind; no major roof or wall damage from ice dams. Tom kept a check on the temperatures and adjusted the heat as needed, and at times kept water running from the faucets to prevent water from freezing in the pipes. He tried to resolve some of the ice dams on the Nave roof. We did have some small drips down the Nave walls, and I have asked Eric to wash them down. Later this spring or early summer, we have been thinking about having our Nave roof evaluated by Mike McDonald – from the Building Inspector of America. We worked with him several years ago regarding the rectory and the roof on Sackett and Stevens Halls. There have been concerns expressed about this 20+ year roof getting through another winter, but we will need to ascertain what we will be doing with our buildings in the near future, before we take on the expense of replacing the roof.

The WMA has taken good care of the rectory all winter and are still happy with our arrangement.

The new driveway repair that was done last November has held up beautifully this past winter – no potholes, heaves or cracks! That was a job very well done.

Tom has checked all the kneelers in the Nave and found about 20 are in need of repair. He has ordered all the parts necessary, and they are beginning to arrive. Eric will do the repairs. Tom and John Goetcheus have cleaned the inside of the windows above the organ. That project involved two people and three ladders. They intend to clean the outside when it is a little warmer and less windy. John also repaired the cracks and painted the north wall of the rear entrance. At some point, he plans to paint the opposite wall of the rear entrance.



Our offer still stands to donate the Ark to CTK, so hopefully their Property Committee can determine if they still want it, and we can help get it there.

For the past couple years, I have been making up a schedule for our Welcoming Ministries (Ushers and Coffee Hour). It had worked well most of the time, and I appreciate everyone’s cooperation to keep things going. But I have been getting many requests from people to be removed from the “pool”, for many various reasons, and it is getting very difficult to make up a schedule. It is filled through May. I have decided I will no longer make up a schedule, but will post a calendar for June and July, ask people to look at their schedules, find a Sunday that fits their schedule, and help to keep things going by voluntarily signing up.



June and July worship will be at Epiphany, and in August, we will worship at CTK (They will take care of things there). What is needed for Coffee Hour will be one or two people to make coffee (or during the warmer times – iced tea, lemonade, and water), and something simple to accompany the drinks. It has gotten pretty fancy – like a mini-breakfast, which is very nice, but all that is actually needed is something simple to go with the coffee/tea/lemonade.

## LUTH-SCOPALIAN LEXICON

**“Lutheran” and “Episcopalian” . . .**



Perhaps it seems a bit obvious, and should have been covered in a previous *Lexicon*, but what about these terms, “Lutheran” and “Episcopalian”?

“Episcopalian” reflects the importance of Bishops, or The Episcopacy, in The Episcopal Church (TEC). A great emphasis is put on the regional Diocese, headed by the Bishop. TEC has deacons, priests, and bishops - but whereas not every parish has a deacon, or even a called priest, every parish has a bishop. Some other churches emphasize other parts of the church structure - Presbyterians emphasize the ministry of the Presbyter (or priest) and Congregationalists emphasize the ministry of the whole laity (the congregation). A common linguistic mistake is the use of “Episcopal” and “Episcopalian.” “Episcopalians” attend “Episcopal” churches - not “Episcopals” attending “Episcopalian” churches.

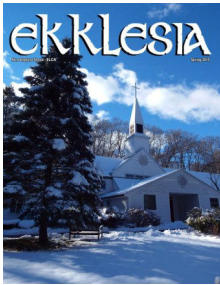
“Lutheran” obviously comes from the reformer, Martin Luther. However, the use of “Lutheran” to describe his followers was originally an insult. One can imagine the derision of “Those Lutheran heretics!” Luther and his followers referred to themselves as “evangelicals” - the term still widely used in his native Germany. While that term has taken on different connotations in the United States, Evangelical really means “pertaining to the Good News.” Some Lutherans style themselves as “Evangelical Catholics” - emphasizing the Lutheran focus on the Good News, while also their place in Christ’s one Holy Catholic and apostolic church.

In the end Lutherans and Episcopalians are both evangelical, both minister with their bishops and most of all, are both followers of Christ - Christians - a name we can all agree on.

## ELCA Presiding Bishop Leads Delegation to London, Geneva, and Rome

CHICAGO (ELCA) – In an endeavor to learn, share and deepen dialogue with Christian partners around the world, the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), led a delegation of ELCA leaders Feb. 1-13, 2015, to meet with religious leaders in London, Geneva and Rome.

"Our pilgrimage to Canterbury, Geneva and Rome gave me a sense of the breadth of the church. The Anglican Communion, The Lutheran World Federation, World Council of Churches and the Roman Catholic Church span the globe and, in their history and tradition, span the centuries. The church is catholic – small c – and the ELCA is part of that," said Eaton.

"While we should be mindful of our context in North America, and while we should be able to engage our particular

culture, we should remember that the way we tend the gospel treasure entrusted to this part of the church has implications for the rest of the church. It's not just about us. It's not just about now," she said.

ELCA leaders who participated in the journey led by Eaton are the Rev. Conrad Selnick, vice president for advancement and church relations, Bexley Seabury Seminary Federation; the Rev. Donald P. Kreiss, bishop of the ELCA Southeast Michigan Synod and chair of the ELCA Conference of Bishops' ecumenical and inter-religious relations liaison committee; the Rev. Patricia J. Lull, bishop of the ELCA Saint Paul Area Synod; the Rev. Elizabeth Ekdale and the Rev. William E. Flippin Jr., members of the ELCA Church Council; Kathryn Lohre, executive for ELCA Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Relations; and the Rev. Donald McCoid, director for ELCA Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Relations.
